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PULITZER PRIZE WINNING WRITER TO READ AT CABRILLO COLLEGE



First annual Morton Marcus Memorial Poetry Reading at Cabrillo Music Recital Hall



The First Annual Morton Marcus Memorial Poetry Reading honors poet, teacher, and film critic Morton Marcus (1936–2009). Marcus, a cultural icon of Santa Cruz County, passed away from cancer in October of 2009. He was named Santa Cruz County Artist of the Year 1999, and was also a recipient of the Gail Rich Award in 2007 for his outstanding contributions to the cultural life of Santa Cruz.

"Morton was a man of incredible energy," stated follow poet Joe Stroud. "He had enormous passions and he pursued them with zeal. He lived the life of the mind, and he lived the life of the heart as well."

Throughout his life, Marcus actively brought together many of the art communities in the county. Among his active pursuits was his great belief in the importance and richness of poetry to our culture. The Annual Morton Marcus Memorial Poetry Reading, cosponsored by Poetry Santa Cruz, Ow Family Properties, Cabrillo College, UCSC and Community TV of Santa Cruz County, plans to honor Marcus and his beliefs by bringing an acclaimed writer to the admission-free Memorial Reading each year. This year's inaugural event features acclaimed poet and writer Robert Hass.

Hass, who was the U.S. Poet Laureate from 1995 to 1997, fondly recalls, "Morton was one of my earliest literary friends. He was a larger-than-life presence—startlingly generous, funny, intelligent; passionate about poetry, movies, music, and endlessly a pleasure to talk to. I think he made everyone feel better, feel life was more interesting, a way of being in the world that could have been exhausting to most, but didn't seem to be for Mort. His presence was a gift, and so it is an honor, both sweet and serious, to get to read at an occasion to remember his life and work."


The evening, hosted by Santa Cruz's first poet laureate Gary Young, will highlight Hass reading from his own work, as well as readings by Joseph Stroud and Stephen Kessler from Marcus's final and newly published book The Dark Figure in the Doorway: Last Poems.

The reading will conclude with a book sale and signing by Robert Hass of his newest book The Apple Trees at Olema: New and Selected Poems, as well as signings by Joe Stroud, Stephen Kessler and Gary Young. Marcus's The Dark Figure in the Doorway: Last Poems will also be available for sale. Marcus completed the book shortly before his death. The poems, most written in the last years of his life, reflect on human folly, cruelty, greed, our obligations to the past, his belief in the power of the imagination, and the spiritual redemption of art.

The book is published by White Pine Press of New York.

Robert Hass is a poet, essayist, and translator. His most recent book, The Apple Trees at Olema: New and Selected Poems, was published by Ecco Press. His work has received the Pulitzer Prize for poetry in 2008, the National Book Award in poetry in 2007, and he has twice received the National Book Critics Circle Award, once for criticism in 1985 and once for poetry in 1998. He also served as poet Laureate of the United States from 1995-97. A native of the Bay Area, he teaches English and Environmental Studies at the University of California at Berkeley.

Poet, teacher, and film critic Morton Marcus (1936-2009) was a cultural icon of Santa Cruz County for over 40 years. He was the Santa Cruz County Artist of the Year 1999 and a recipient of the Gail Rich Award in 2007 for his outstanding contributions to the cultural life of Santa Cruz. Among his published works are eleven volumes of poetry, including The Santa Cruz Mountain Poems, Pages from a Scrapbook of Immigrants, Moments Without Names, Shouting Down the Silence, Pursuing the Dream Bone, a novel, and his literary memoir, Striking Through the Masks. He taught English and Film at Cabrillo College for thirty years, was the co-host



of the longest running poetry radio program in the nation, The Poetry Show, and was the co-host of the television film review show, Cinema Scene.

Mort Marcus's Poetry Archive is now housed at UCSC's Special Collections. Mort's personal papers, manuscripts, and recordings reflect his legacy as a poet and educator, and his collection of poetry books, broadsides, literary magazines and correspondence with other poets and writers illuminates his deep involvement in and passion for the literary art of poetry. 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
